NLHS COMMUNICATION ACCESS INITIATIVE (CAI)

Communication Disabilities Access Canada describes communication access as policies and practices "that ensure that people understand what is said or written and can communicate what they want to convey in all interactions." As many are aware, Supported Conversation for Adults with Aphasia (SCATM) is a training protocol designed by the Aphasia Institute in Toronto, Canada and recommended for all healthcare providers working in stroke care in Canadian Stroke Best Practice Recommendations. This training teaches evidence-based strategies to healthcare employees to improve communication with people with aphasia. The strategies are also relevant for use with people with dementia, hearing loss, English as a second language, and language impairments from other neurological conditions.

The NLHS Communication Access Initiative was created and is led by S-LP, Alyson King. It involves: 1) Specializing SLPs to train others, 2) Training frontline staff across the continuum of care in SCATM strategies, 3) Providing increased access to communication resources in healthcare facilities, and 4) Working with leadership to promote communication access.

Through the NLHS Communication Access Initiative, we now have 10 specialized S-LPs across the province and over 500 staff have been trained since April 2024. Through funding received from a HIROC Safety Inspire Grant, we are able to



increase access to communication resources for staff across the province. 12 provincial category A hospitals will receive "Communication Stations" over the coming weeks. Communication Stations are designed as a part of the Communication Access Project to be set up on units to educate patients, families, and staff and to help facilitate health-related conversations. Ideally, these stations are paired with SCATM staff training. All resources were printed by a Newfoundland-based company, Quikprint, on washable paper to promote longevity and ensure infection prevention and control (IPAC) compliance.

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NLHS INTEGRATION UPDATES

With amalgamation of the 4 health authorities, audiology and speechlanguage pathology staff in the four health zones across NL Health Services are seeing many changes. We'll try to share those changes in each in issue.

Newfoundland and Labrador Health Services (NLHS) continues to move along as a single, integrated health authority with initiatives and collaborations taking place in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology (SLP). One such collaboration is the development of a provincial SLP Professional Practice Council (PPC), chaired by Rhonda Halfyard, Provincial Professional Practice Consultant for Speech-Language Pathology and Manager of Audiology (Eastern Zones).

The inaugural meeting of the SLP Provincial Council was held in February 2025 and another was held in April. Meetings have been well attended with wide provincial and program representation. The aim of the newly formed council is to bring together provincial SLPs in health to understand and support existing or newly established zonal/local PPCs, as well as to collaborate and coordinate shared areas of practice such as clinical documentation (EPIC), diet texture modifications and limits of




confidentiality to name a few. Work is ongoing to develop Terms of Reference. Within the larger professional practice framework work is also ongoing to standardize the Professional Practice Model across the province.
